## SOUTH FLORIDA CULTURAL CONSORTIUM ANNOUNCES **RECIPIENTS OF 2015/16 VISUAL & MEDIA ARTISTS AWARDS**

MIAMI, FLORIDA – The South Florida Cultural Consortium (SFCC) announced twelve (12) awards to preeminent South Florida artists through its 2015/2016 Visual and Media Artists Program. The Consortium, an alliance of the arts councils of Broward, Martin, Miami-Dade, Monroe and Palm Beach Counties, has recognized six individuals from Miami-Dade County, three from Broward County, two from Palm Beach County, and one from Monroe County. The awards are conferred at either the \$15,000 or \$7,500 level. These awards are among the largest such honors accorded by local arts agencies to visual and media artists in the United States.

The selected artists are: from Broward County: Anthony Anaya, Madeleine Denaro and Sri Prabha; from Miami-Dade County: Kevin Arrow, Cara Despain, Marlon Johnson, Pepe Mar, Charo Oquet and Kenny Riches; from Monroe County: Deborah Goldman; and from Palm Beach County: TD Gillispie and Natalia Laskis.

The recipients were selected through a two-tier panel process which included the participation of regional and national arts experts. The 2015-2016 regional panel, whose adjudications are conducted totally anonymously and are based solely on the evaluation of the artists' work as evidenced by the work samples submitted, included: Jose Diaz, Curator, Bass Museum of Art (Miami-Dade); Dara Friedman, Artist, 2014-2015 SFCC Award Recipient (Miami-Dade); Silvia Lizama, Artist, 2014-2015 SFCC Award Recipient (Broward); Jillian Mayer, Artist, 2013 - 2014 SFCC Award Recipient (Broward); Diani Nawi, Curator, Jorge M. Pérez Art Museum of Miami-Dade County (Miami-Dade); and Amanda Sanfilippo, Director of Development, Locust Projects (Miami-Dade). The submissions selected by the regional panel for further consideration were forwarded for final adjudication

and selection to the national panel, which was comprised of: Susan Thompson, Assistant Curator, Guggenheim (New York); Susan Kleinberg, Artist (New York); and Jose Carlos Diaz, Curator, Andy Warhol Museum (Pittsburgh, PA).

An exhibition featuring the works of the twelve recipients will be on view at the Art and Culture Center/Hollywood, 1650 Harrison Street in Hollywood, Florida from September 8, 2017 through October 22, 2017.

Other support and services are provided by TicketWeb for the Culture Shock Miami program, the Greater Miami Convention and Visitors Bureau, the South Florida Cultural Consortium and the Tourist Development Council.
