ARTS EDUCATION COMMITTEE MEETING

MINUTES

July 31, 2019, 4 PM



ATTENDING: Chairman Tony Anderson, Kimberly Everman, Duncan Hurd, Faith Paul, Marie Jureit-Beamish. Staff: Nancy Turrell, Laura Daniel, Jennifer Hearn.

Chairman Tony Anderson called the meeting to order at 4:05 pm.

Duncan Hurd moved to approve the May 1, 2019 minutes with a second from Faith Paul. Motion carried unanimously.

Nancy Turrell briefed the committee that they would remain as a committee of the Arts Council during a transition that included our Arts Foundation for Martin County taking on a greater role in the fundraising and support for programs of the Council. As such, starting October 1, she noted the committee would be subject to Florida's Sunshine Laws and committee members would need to restrict conversation about the business of the committee to publicly noticed formal meetings of the committee. She added that there will be additional information provided to members beforehand. It was noted that future agenda will have a "public comment" section.

Nancy Turrell reported that there was no new information about the historic Stuart High School becoming a cultural center. Members indicated their support for the project and offered to assist. Nancy advised that when a date was set on a school board agenda she would inform the members.

Kimberly Everman updated the committee on the Constitution Week – 8th Grade Art Project and Field Trip. Discussion included a review of the proposed rubric for judging and the timeline. The Arts Council committed to providing no less than \$125 in prizes which may be combined with supplies to enhance the award. The Council will be responsible for selecting the "PatriARTic Award" or award of excellence; whereas Chick Fil A will select additional awards from among the 10 finalists. Committee members suggested the awards be the red, white and blue awards, rather than the traditional 1st, 2nd and 3rd place. Judges will include committee members Faith Paul and Kimberly Everman. A third judge will be invited.

Nancy reviewed the attached strategic plan strategies as they exist within the Council's strategic plan. It was discussed that this committee should take on a role that includes more advocacy locally to ensure that opportunities are afforded to students in the district across the geographic spread and across all artistic discipline.

Staff provided updates on the following active programs of the Arts Council:

- a. Storytime in the Gallery: Laura Daniel reported that the Teddy Bear Academy at the YMCA will be attending monthly. Kimberly will reach out and ask the school district VPK program.
- b. Plein Air Arts Day: Jennifer reported that a grant had been submitted that would allow us to present the Plein Air Arts Day program to high school students in 2020. Notification of the grant award will occur around October 1st.

Announcements:

- Arts Education Week, September 8-14, 2019. Nancy stated they would promote it via social media. Kimberly noted it is promoted to arts-related teachers within the district.

- Jennifer stated she would be attending the visual arts teachers meeting in early August.

The next meeting for September 25 at 4 pm.
