- Florida Attractions Association Reopening Florida Attractions
- Define Nomadic Space: Arts Organizing, Pandemic, and Virtual Experience
 - This virtual Q&A will address the concept of nomadic grassroots arts organizations. Key points to consider are the longevity of such nomadic operations, redefining
 the traditional gallery, virtual experiences, and funding. Presently, in response to a global pandemic, what role nomadic spaces play in developing interventions or
 furthering online arts engagement.
- Art Education in the Red: Strategies for Cultural Education and Resilience
 - How does change-making begin with limited resources? How do arts organizations and educators come together through innovative/integrative strategies to
 generate holistic approaches toward teaching art; specifically, making space for minoritarian, underrepresented, and economically diverse participants and young
 artists? This panel discussion includes audience participation in order to share ideas and resources.
- Risk Assessment for Performing Arts Organizations
 - This webinar will focus on mitigating risks at institutions, to prevent disasters from happening and to reduce the impact of unavoidable disasters. The session will
 clarify the need for risk assessment as a part of an organization's disaster preparedness strategy, provide basic information on risk assessment tools and practices,
 and address how risk assessment can benefit performing arts organizations. The instructor will also present case studies as a part of the session, so participants
 can learn from actual disasters in performing arts organizations.
- Reimagining the Economy with Innovative Support
 - When we consider the economy, and specifically the arts economy, funders have continued to solely practice project-based funding. However, although we see a shift in the philanthropic sector towards granting more GOS funding in the wake of the COVID-19 crisis, is that enough for artists to thrive? But if funders are to support artists holistically beyond projects (i.e. provide support towards real estate ownership, furthering education, etc.), how should funders be more strategic and forward thinking?
- Re-creating Trust With Your Guests
 - You've already earned the trust of your guests and most loyal customers. However, now and in a post-COVID world, you need to work to re-create that trust. The
 promise of a safe, seamless and fun guest experience has a new meaning now, as guests put a much heavier demand on your attraction to provide the extra-step

safety measures and experience alterations that ensure they don't get sick. Are you ready to provide these measures and re-create the trust you've already established with your customer base?

- Virtual Engagement, Digital Experiences, and Online Learning During the COVID-19 Pandemic
 - Come together with your peers in science and technology centers and museums to discuss the approaches you have been using to virtually engage your communities, develop new digital experiences, and design and scale online learning while your museums are closed to the public due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Arts Writers Grant Program
 - o The Arts Writers Grant supports emerging and established writers who are writing about contemporary visual art. Ranging from \$15,000 to \$50,000, these grants support projects addressing both general and specialized art audiences, from short reviews for magazines and newspapers to in-depth scholarly studies.

Who is eligible:

- Creative professionals with a demonstrable exhibition, publishing, or performance history that clearly indicates an active and sustained career in the fields of dance, theatre, music, literature, and the visual arts.
- Artists must be residents of Martin County, FL for 1 year prior to time of application

Who is not eligible:

- · Artists who are enrolled in a degree or certificate-granting program of any kind at the time of application. Applications will not be accepted before graduation date.
- Artists working full-time as teaching staff at a college or university at the time of application are not eligible for the ARTIST RELIEF
- Artists who are 18 years of age or younger.

Eligible categories of support include:

- Fee coverage for cancelled performances.
- Fee coverage for performances the artist turned down due to health concerns related to COVID-19 (immunocompromised artists, caregiver artists, etc.).
- Funding for cancelled exhibitions, art or craft shows, or other art-related events.
- Funding for cancelled art-related speaking fees (visiting artist lectures, presentations, studio visits, critiques).
- Funding for cancelled non-credit art-related teaching opportunities (workshops, weekly classes). Note: this does not apply to teaching within a K- 12 or higher education institution.
