

Kate Armstrong The Light Inside Sculpture \$300

I have been obsessed with lanterns for as long as I can remember. I've decorated multiple lanterns before but never built my bases from scratch. Purchasing them at thrift or craft stores made them feel like they lacked authenticity to me. It didn't matter how indistinguishable they were, I wanted to make a lantern that truly felt like my own and stood out from the rest. It was this feeling of self-authenticity and desire for self-improvement that inspired me to make the lantern itself.

I bought a 40-pack of chopsticks and tore out the pages of old books my dad gave me. I wrapped the chopsticks in these pages and glued them together. I carved out four cardboard triangles and one cardboard square for the bottom and top panels of the lantern. Once the base was finished, I used more book pages to make origami flowers, vines, and butterflies. For the candle inside, I took an LED candle and covered it with book pages like I did with chopsticks. When I was done, I realized it didn't have a handle to carry it by. I took some twine from home and glued it into the lantern. It took me a total of 2 months to complete it, but it was worth every second because I achieved my goal of authenticity. Jaime Breter *Gybi* Sculpture \$100


Tania Carrera Holy Abandonment Painting \$275

Hilary Equila Chumil Block Print Tile Printmaking \$300

This was a block printing project which required 3 or more colors. My inspiration was tiling design patterns I had seen online. Most of these designs resembled a pattern of a flower and that's what I went for the first part of the design. It seemed a bit too spacious for just that flower alone so I went onto add smaller details surrounding it. I added a border to help with keeping everything in balance, as an outline of where the flower block should be placed, and to wrap the whole design together as one. I chose the colors purple and blue to make the pink colored portion pop up a bit more.



Jessica Cordes *Resistance* Printmaking \$220

This piece revolves around the theme of spiritual resistance. In this image, an underground library is presented. Through examination of historical documents I found that during challenging periods, people created underground libraries. For example, during the holocaust, many people sought to keep their beliefs to themselves and preserve their identities, so they created these libraries as sanctuaries where religious books could be hidden. People of all ages and gender sought solace in these hidden havens and were shielded from oppressive forces. On top of the stack of books, a butterfly can be seen. Across cultures, butterflies symbolize resilience and hope in times of oppression. Children would draw them to be put up and shown as a symbol of the souls lost and reborn. The composition of this piece is made up of both screen printing and colored pencil. Before this piece, I was already familiar with screen printing. With this piece, I had a paper sketch, photocopied my sketch onto a sheet of acetate, and burned it onto a screen, which I had never done before. I placed my base colors with colored pencil onto paper, and then printed my screen on top with ink.




Paige D. Reflections Painting \$300

I did want to capture some of the more realistic aspects so for the palm trees I did utilize highlights and shadows to get that more realistic feel. 
Mia Lindstamer The Girl In the Flowers Painting \$220


Kennedy M. What is She Doing? Drawing \$400

All this is because of an inexcusably dead pancreas. Everyday, every morning, and every night. 12:00 AM to 12:00PM. No matter the circumstances, for the rest of their lives. It's not typical to see a teenager injecting a needle into their arm in public. They are victims of a disease that will never escape them. Type One Diabetes is quite common, nevertheless, many adolescents and most adults have no knowledge about it. Nina P. The Other Woman Drawing \$300




Ava S. Butterfly Girl Mixed Media \$275
