Lawrence A. Sanders **Lifetime Achievement in the Arts** **Jim Dirks**

Born in Washington State and raised in Maryland, Jim Dirks discovered his passion for art at age five with a Jon Gnagy art kit—completing it before the New Year! In high school, he and a fellow student taught themselves to use the ceramics tools and kilns at their new school, sparking a lifelong love of creating. In 1977, a three-week vacation to Florida turned into a permanent move. Over the years, Jim worked on boats, installed solar systems, and served as a lifeguard.

After a melanoma diagnosis in 1982, he turned to stained glass—a hobby that became a 43-year career alongside his wife, Tess. Together, they have created stunning art glass for homes, churches, and businesses throughout the Treasure Coast.

Beyond his studio, Jim played a key role in revitalizing Downtown Stuart, helping secure the Main Street Program that brought new life to the community. After 25 years on West Ocean Boulevard, Jim and Tess recently moved their studio to a new location on Federal Highway, beginning an exciting next chapter in their artistic journey.



Excellence in Arts Education **Tami Conrad**

Tami Conrad has dedicated 35 years to teaching art in a high school setting. She earned her Master's Degree in Education from Kutztown University in Pennsylvania and discovered her love for art as a middle school camper, traveling to local attractions to draw and returning to the studio to critique her work.

Throughout her career, Tami developed lesson plans and curriculums for students from kindergarten through 12th grade and established the IB Art Program at South Fork High School. She recently introduced a ceramics program, expanding opportunities for students to explore new mediums. Her greatest joy has always been watching students create, experiment, and grow—building meaningful relationships along the way.

Now retired, Tami looks forward to focusing on her own painting and ceramics, traveling, teaching yoga, and spending time with family.



Arts Leadership **Tammy Calabria**

For over two decades, Tammy Calabria has led The Children's Museum of the Treasure Coast, serving as CEO for 17 years and transforming it from an abandoned building into a vibrant hub of learning, creativity, and discovery. While not an artist in the traditional sense, Tammy's admiration for

the arts and the courage to share one's talents has shaped both her personal passions and professional mission.

Growing up in sports, leadership and public speaking came naturally, while painting, performing, or composing remained a mystery she deeply respected. "If I could play a sport, speak to a crowd, and perform at the same time, I would," she jokes. This perspective fuels her appreciation for artistic individuality—every painting, song, or performance carries the artist's energy and personality. Her personal creative outlet is photography, capturing moments that, like art, are uniquely irreplaceable.

Under Tammy's leadership, the museum has become a community cornerstone, offering hands-on exhibits and programs that inspire imagination and lifelong learning. She has woven the arts into every facet of the museum—from exhibits to STEAM programming—championing creativity as essential to developing well-rounded young minds.

Her achievements include leading the \$5 million campaign that opened the museum in 2008, expanding programs and exhibits, building community partnerships, and securing grants. In her words, "The arts inspire creativity and spark imagination—and that is what transforms a building into a place where dreams begin."

Dr. Faith, a PhD from the University of Chicago, is passionate about all forms of art and the universal connection they create between artists and audiences. She believes the arts are inclusive, offering moments of reflection, joy, and inspiration to everyone, everywhere.

Seventeen years living in Hawaii's rich and diverse cultures, along with her experience as a professor and researcher in the social sciences and history, have deepened her appreciation for the ways humans think, feel, and express themselves. Dr. Faith celebrates this shared humanity through her engagement in the arts and the arts community.

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Special Recognition

The Lyric Theatre in honor of their 100th Anniversary

Weaving together the history of The Lyric Theatre, over the past 99 years, is a story of community, commitment, and creativity. Built in 1925 by Judge John Hancock and his wife, Mamie, as a 900-seat silent movie house with a small stage and retail storefronts. The Lyric opened March 15, 1926, and quickly became Stuart's cultural heart and served its residents.

Throughout the decades, The Lyric was used for a variety of purposes, including movies, newsweeklies, traveling vaudeville shows, presentations, and weekly church services.

In 1987, visionary realtor Roy Laycock saw The Lyric as an anchor for the revitalization of downtown and a much-needed entertainment center. Through the years, dedicated teams of volunteers, donors, patrons, board members, and staff have raised funds, secured grants, and led grassroots efforts to preserve and protect this historic gem and cultural resource.

The thriving Lyric we know today is a testament to the community, and The Lyric remains dedicated to providing access to the arts, inspiring creativity, and enriching the cultural life of the Treasure Coast for generations to come.

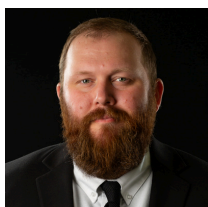

I believe in the importance of planting seeds of self-worth, imagination, and belonging at an early age. My goal is to use story telling as a joyful, uplifting tool that helps children see themselves as powerful and important – no matter their background. I aim to create work that is emotionally honest, accessible, and capable of making a positive impact on individuals and communities alike."
