I want to explore the complex and unique traits of animals that I draw from, while maintaining their individual integrity. The challenge comes not in simply creating a design, but creating a design that is not only visually appealing but also showing the true nature of the marine life I drew from. The portfolio raises many questions: How does one create a garment that encompasses the true nature of marine life? Should I focus on preserving the integrity of the animal, or on creating a fashionable dress? Do I purely pull from color or do I use more irregular characteristics? Should I only preserve the color of the animal, or should I use more irregular characteristics? Does the garment have to look like a traditional dress? Furthermore, should fashion have to follow preconceived ideals and expectations set by society? What makes a dress fashionable, and what makes leaves it wanting? I had started this portfolio using more traditional techniques and designs. However, as time progressed, I decided that keeping the message of the art was more important than having a dress that looked traditional. I used more irregular forms, bold colors, and protruding shapes in an effort to truly capture the animals image. Marine Imitation taught me the importance of integrity. The garments shown in my portfolio may not be traditional, but I feel that they truly represent the animals that they are based on. I believe that I managed to catch a piece of the beauty and individuality that makes these creatures unique, and I wouldn't have been able to be pushed out of my comfort zone without this contest. of the Marine Imitation shows the importance of using media to be inventive and show more than just your everyday outfit.





"The art of fashion" series is a pair of garments that pulls from different art styles and mediums. While creating the pieces the question that guided my work was: how can I use imagery and materials to create works of art through fashion pieces? I first started to explore this idea by doing a reimagining of the famous art piece "The Kiss". I wanted to see if art is still recognizable once to take it out of its original form. I hand painted the fabric with acrylic paint and fabric medium thus making my own fabric pattern. I had to decide which parts of the art work are most integral to the piece that I had to keep in my design. This piece was a challenge of material and reinvention. In my second piece "The Battle of Gods" I draw influence from older art styles and chose to do a more challenging medium. Thus the garment is influenced by Greek red pottery and the design created using bleach. When experimenting I found that when using bleach on black fabric it created a color that resembled the pottery. After learning this I used blacked fabric as a base when sewing the garment then I proceed to hand paint the fabric with bleach and a paintbrush. I choose to create a garment whose silhouette I feel represents the shape of a vase. The top of the garment is influenced by the neck of a Greek vase while the bottom mirrors the body of the vase which tells the story of a battle between gods.

Henna is the complex designs done through natural dyes to darken skin. I attempt to mimic the designs through the use of paper cutouts. I started by tracing hands on black paper and then I drew out various designs based on traditional henna tattoos. From there I proceeded to use an exacto knife to cut out the designs. With black paper I was able to use the negative space to create imagery that mirrors the designs seen in the tattoos. When presenting my piece I use motifs such as suns and multiple hands to create a cohesive piece that represents power and strength. As well as the never ending reach to one another.








Tatum Bean
