

I experimented with the background and the shadow of the pinecone by loosely blending together the charcoal with the gesso. I liked the effect that the scratchy charcoal and the smooth gesso made in the background. Overall my piece has a dark ominous feel with an added pop of light and color. My work shows how creativity can transform anything into art, even a regular pinecone.



I tried to mold my memories of visiting the local bakery with my grandmother and trying all the baked goods and sweet breads in the store into one finished piece of artwork. I recently received alcohol markers from my mother, and I wanted to test out the new medium. I began by blocking in colors over a colored pencil sketch. I tried my best to split up all the brown with green and purple breads so the piece wouldn't have patches of brown all over the image. I then added some color variation in the shadows to further cut down the amount of brown. I decided on the color blue since I wanted a contrasting color to the large amounts of orangey brown tones in the bread. One road bump I hit on the way was the lack of texture in the piece. At this point I only used alcohol markers which mainly drew on flat and just blended together. However, I found a solution. I used colored pencils to not only add texture but to saturate the blue shadows among the baked goods. All in all, I had a lot of fun playing around with colors and experimenting with new mediums. And I'm excited for what the future holds.
